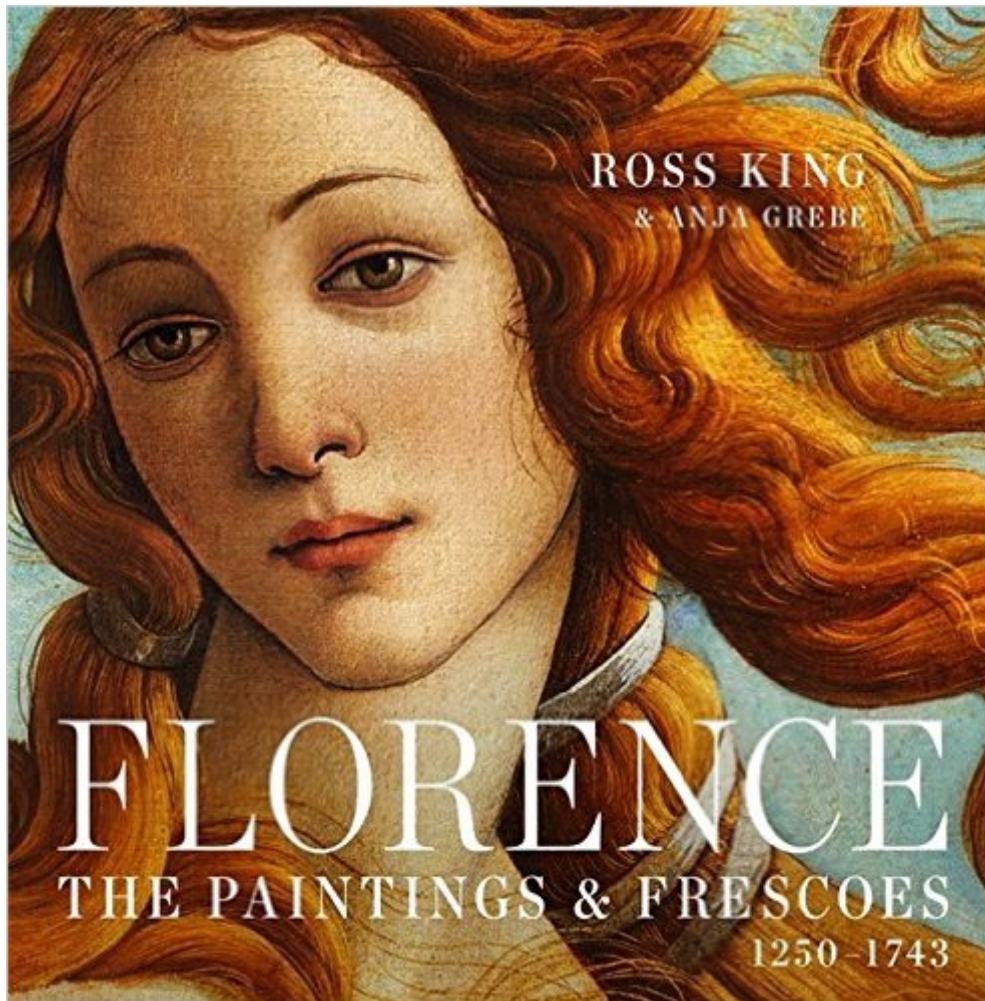

Every painted work that is on display in the Uffizi Gallery, The Pitti Palace, the Accademia, and the Duomo is included in the book, plus many or most of the works from 28 of the city's other magnificent museums and churches. The research and text are by Ross King (best-selling author), Anja Grebe (author of *The Louvre* and *The Vatican*), Cristina Acidini (former Superintendent of the public museums of Florence) and Msgr. Timothy Verdon (Director of the artworks for the Archdiocese of Florence).

This book delivers on its promise of including all the paintings in the Uffizi and the Pitti Palace, and it includes photos of frescoes in several churches that I can't find elsewhere. The problem, as stated in another review, is that many of the pictures are quite small. There are sometimes as many as 11 works reproduced on a single page, and nine per page is common. Despite this major flaw, I like the book and am keeping it because it does contain many pictures not available elsewhere and because the larger reproductions are often larger than those in other books; there are also some stunning double-page details. Among the churches and buildings whose frescoes are included are: Santa Croce, San Marco, Ognisanti, the Bargello, the Palazzo Vecchio, Santa Trinita, the Duomo, Santa Maria del Carmine, the Orsanmichele, and Santa Maria Novella. In summary, this book will

delight you by what it includes, and frustrate you because some of the illustrations are so small. It is definitely worth having, but, if you really love these paintings, you will want at least one other book with larger reproductions. (Really, is it possible to have too many?) A good choice for another book: the Bulfinch Press 1994 book "Paintings in the Uffizi and Pitti Galleries."

I was disappointed in this book. A large number of works (e.g., the Santa Croce frescoes by Giotto) are presented in so small a format that their figures or characteristics are difficult or impossible to elucidate. In addition, multiple works included on a single page are identified by notes listed top to bottom (with no numbering) while the related paintings are presented left to right; this requires careful self-checking of the minimal annotation (overleaf enlargements are not identified at all). Most painfully, there are mistakes (e.g., John the Baptist, rather than John the Evangelist, is identified in the Lamentation (Pieta) by Giovanni da Milano). Enjoy this book for its selection of large images and related notes on the most popular exhibits in Florence, and as a gazetteer for your next visit.
